# Key information

- Portfolio based
  - must include a minimum of two observations
- Pass / Fail grading
- Registrations from 3<sup>rd</sup> June 2024
- Qualification review in July 2027

# Background

- Skills for Care, Health Education England and Skills for Health
- 15 standards
- Response to inconsistencies in previous Care Certificate
- The 'People at the Heart of Care' White Paper
- Commitment to consistency in delivery
- Care professionals to have the same introductory skills, knowledge, and behaviours.
- Regulated by Ofqual

# Entry Requirements

- Learners aged 19+
- Working within Adult Social Care sector
- Person-centred, values-driven care, support for the services
- No prior qualifications needed
- Centres must assess each learner is suitable
- Learners must undertake an employer induction

# Assessment

- Learning Outcomes start with '**Be able to...**'
- Assessment Criteria start with '**Demonstrate**'

Assessment Guidance says:

'Skills-based assessment must include **direct observation as the main source of evidence** and must be carried out over an appropriate period of time'



# Assessment

Units that do not require direct observation: 9, 11, 15

Assessment guidance says:

‘Any Knowledge evidence integral to skills-based learning outcomes may be generated outside of the work environment, but the final assessment decision must show application of knowledge within the real work environment’.

# Delivery and assessment guidance

Lists, definitions, and key information to support planning delivery

Assessment guidance for every unit supports and provides additional information for the assessor.

# Direct observations

Involves watching or listening to a learner while they engage in some type of activity.

Observer takes notes on the learners' skills and understanding.

Afterwards, the observer provides feedback to the learner.



# Direct observation

- Skills for Care suggest 3 observations
- Minimum number is 2 direct observations over a period of time
  - Depending on the activities, organisation, role of the learner
  - Length of observation

Plans might be changed on the day reducing what can be observed

# Assessor competency

- Each assessor must hold a qualification suitable to make appropriate and consistent assessment decisions.
- Joint Awarding Body Quality Group maintains list of assessor qualifications.

# Occupational competency

- Each assessor must be capable of carrying out the full requirements of the area they are assessing.
- May be at unit level for specialist areas: different assessors may be needed across a whole qualification while the final assessment decision for a qualification remains with the lead assessor.
- Maintained annually through clearly demonstrable continuing learning and professional development.
- Each assessor should possess, knowledge and understanding relevant to the qualifications and / or units they are assessing.

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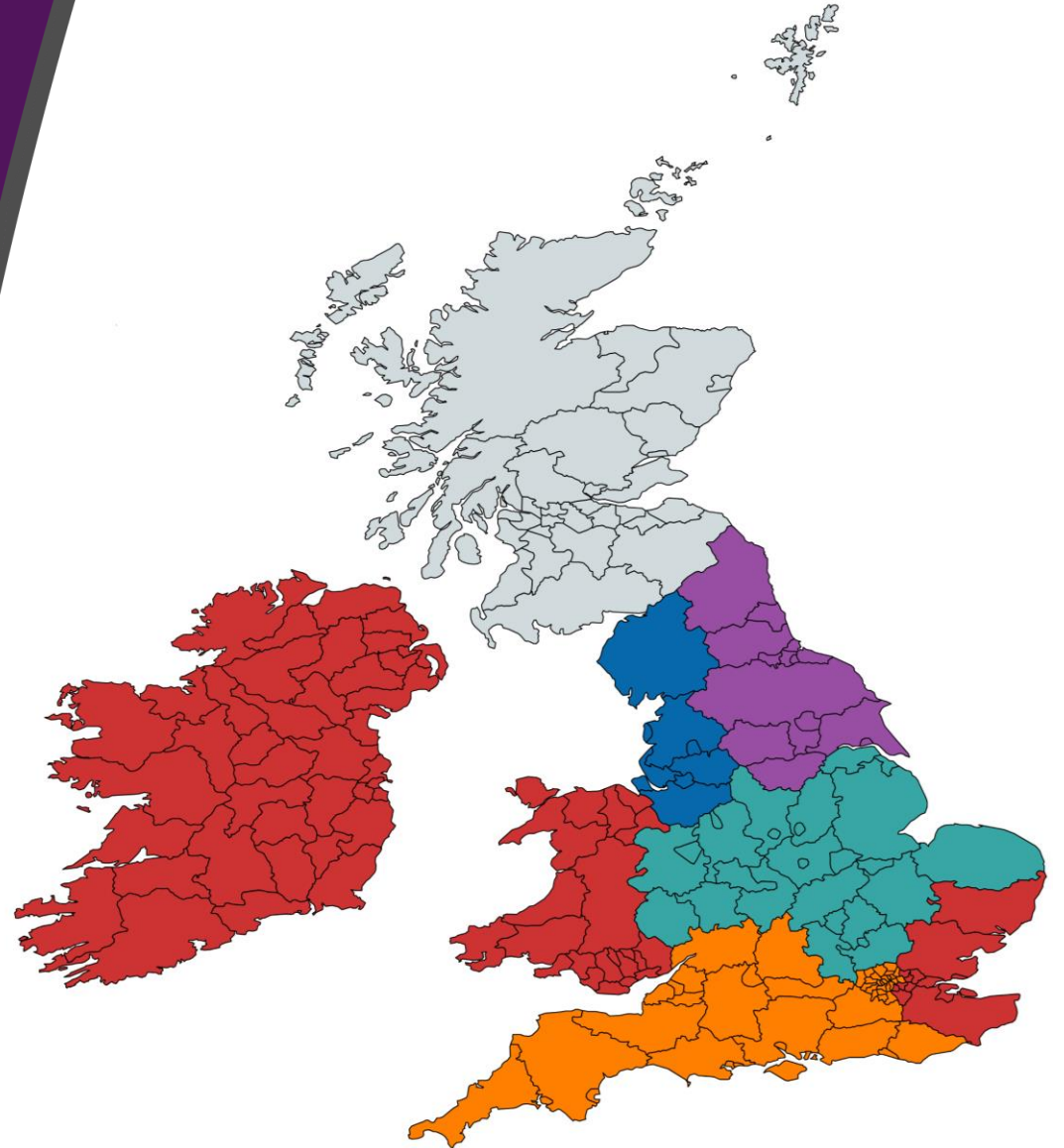
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
